
2021 was a Record-Setting Year for Women in the Wisconsin State Legislature.

Women hold 41 of the 132 seats (31%),¹ up from 36 seats (27%) in 2019. Seats held in 2021 breaks a 30-year stretch when the percentage of seats held by women hovered around 25%, with highest being 29% decades ago, in 1993 and 2003.

31% of WI State Legislators are Women

Nationally

Wisconsin caught up with the nation.
Women make up 30.6% of all state legislators nationwide, versus 31.1% in WI.

There has never been a Native American woman serving in the WI Legislature.

Wisconsin's Tribal Councils & Legislatures

Wisconsin is home to 11 federally recognized Native Nations. Each Nation is led by a Tribal Council or Legislature.

In 2021, women hold 32 (36%) of seats,⁵ down from 38 (42%) in 2015, and continue to outpace representation by women in the state legislature (31%).

One woman currently serves as Tribal chair or president, Shannon Halsey, President, Stockbridge-Munsee Band of Mohican Indians; four serve as a Vice Chair/President.
